Fireplace Safety

Fireplaces can be a source of warmth and enjoyment, but all too often, homeowners instead get sirens, firefighters, and big red firetrucks. Taking your fireplace for granted can be dangerous and expensive.

Dozens of times in winter, we get calls on chimney fires and residence smoke due to neglected fireplaces. It's the same story: "it was OK last year", "I never had a problem" or "we went to bed and awoke to the house on fire". Usually, this can be avoided.

Improper disposal of fireplace ashes causes more problems than chimney fires. Ashes can stay hot and cause a fire for up to three days. Placing them in trash cans, bags or boxes on your deck or dumping them in the woods will cause a fire hours after your fireplace is out.

The best method is to place ashes in a lidded metal container and let them sit for several days. Be cautious when using a natural fiber broom or vacuum to clean out the fireplace: you might find a fire later, started from hidden ashes.

The most common smoking problem occurs when a homeowner forgets to open the damper or it's not fully open and falls shut. Smoke pours into the room and smoke detectors are set off while family members panic and call 911. Smoke fans are used to get the smoke out, but we can't cure an embarrassed face.

Have your fireplace inspected every year. It may or may not need to be cleaned out, but it's critical to check for cracks, blockages, or other maintenance issues. If you've just moved in, have your fireplace inspected: it should be done by a certified chimney sweep company with the education and training to comply with national standards. Keep soot and creosote swept out of the fireplace, as this greatly reduces damage if a chimney fire breaks out.

Other common sense practices include keeping items at least 6 feet away from fireplaces, using screens, plus keeping leaves out of gutters and roof valleys (they become tinder material for roof fires). Children should not be allowed to start a fire or add wood. Avoid cooking, roasting marshmallows or popping corn in the fireplace: this is fun for a campfire outside! These are the best tips to avoid fireplace problems during the cold months.
